## POLICY BRIEFS AND REPORTS

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This briefing contains key recommendations for COP29. In particular, the briefing underscores the need for an ambitious child-responsive New Collective Quantified Goals on climate finance, dedicated to delivering child and gender-responsive outcomes at the scale required, along with a meaningful follow-up to the [Expert Dialogue on Children and Climate Change](#) that took place at Bonn in June 2024. For the sake of the world's 2.4 billion children and future generations, it is essential to maintain focus and momentum, the sharing of good practices and capacity building of Parties on the integration of children's distinct needs, perspectives, and their human rights in climate policies, actions, and finance.

**[Effective Support for Communities Experiencing Climate Mobilities: Lessons from the CJRF Grant Portfolio \(2017 – 2024\)](#)**, **Climate Justice Resilience Fund and United Nations University Institute for Environment and Human Security (UNU-EHS) and the, September 2024**. The Report and Executive Summary are available on the [CJRF website](#) and the UNU Collections [permalink](#). It offers a rare opportunity for partners, funders and policy makers to explore the projects and activities that have been implemented to address climate mobility-related challenges in diverse places around the world.

**[Loss and Damage – Social Cohesion](#)**, **Danish Red Cross and the Danish Institute for International Studies, April 2024**. To support programming efforts, this report provides an overview of current approaches to social cohesion, including links to loss and damage. On the basis of its review of existing approaches and programming and its novel examination of losses to social cohesion on the ground, the report provides key takeaways and possible next steps for actors seeking to engage with social cohesion in practice. The report is part of the study ‘[Displacement, climate change and social cohesion: Exploring loss and damage dynamics](#)’ a cooperation between the Danish Institute for International Studies and the Danish Red Cross, together with the Niger Red Cross and research partners in Ghana.

**[Economic and non-economic in loss and damage: a harmful dichotomy?](#)** **Douwe van Schie, Guy Jackson, Olivia Serdeczny and Kees van der Geest, October 2024**. Loss and damage is treated as comprising separate ‘economic’ and ‘non-economic’ dimensions in research and policy. While this has contributed to greater awareness and visibility of non-economic values, our empirical insights show that the two are inextricably linked and that research aimed at informing policy must be better attuned to the multifaceted and cascading nature of loss and damage.

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**[Accelerating Extreme Heat Responses: Perspectives from India](#)**, **All India Disaster Mitigation Institute (AIDMI), September 2024** focuses on the critical challenge of extreme heat and heatwaves in India. As climate change intensifies, India faces growing threats from rising temperatures that impact public health, livelihoods, agriculture, and economic productivity. The issue brings together perspectives from policymakers, researchers, disaster management experts, and development practitioners to examine India’s vulnerability to extreme heat and outline strategies for building resilience.

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
